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YHWH was telling Moshe the laws for Kohanim. Any of Aharon's offspring that had a blemish could not give offerings for the people. Blemishes included the following: blindness, lameness, one limb longer than the other, broken leg or arm, problems in the eye, or eruptions on the skin.


YHWH told Moshe about the festivals, starting with Shabbat. Every seventh day of the week is Shabbat. We cannot do any work on that day. On the first Hebrew month, on the fifteenth day, is Pesach. From Pesach, we cannot eat leavening (yeast, baking powder, or baking soda, also known as sodium bicarbonate) for seven days. From the day after the weekly Shabbat after Pesach, we start counting fifty days to Shavuot.

On the first day of the seventh Hebrew month, is Yom Teruah, also known as Rosh Hashanah; it is a rest day and we are to blow the shofar on that day. On the tenth day of the same month is Yom Kippur; we are not to eat or drink on that day. On the fifteenth day, is Sukkot. For seven days, we are to sleep in a temporary dwelling. Then on the eighth day is Shemini Atzaret. The first day and the eighth days of Sukkot are Shabbats; we are to rest on these days.

The Torah says that if a man blasphemes or murders, he is to be put to death.




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
